Hay girls took to the field first against Finley and soon learned in the first half they were up for a battle against the away team. The back line were under quite some pressure with most of the ball being maintained in the Finley forward line. Just before the half time siren captain Hannah Stewart went down with an injury so the girls had to rally in the centre and remain strong. After half time the girls went back out to battle and built on their confidence and momentum as a team.

Unfortunately on the final siren Finley had a comfortable win with scores approximately Finley 28 - 1. 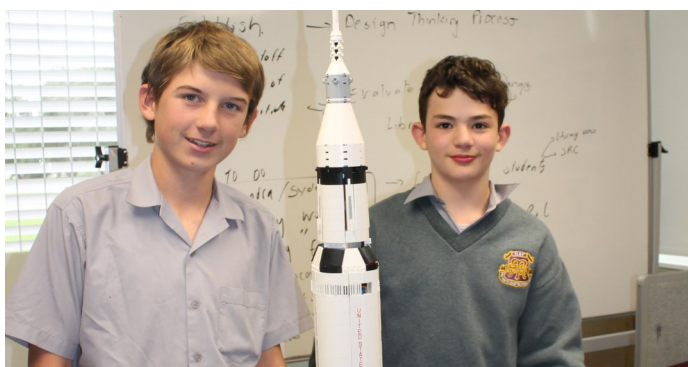
Library News Week 3

This course trains students for entry into a wide range of agricultural industries including beef, horse, cropping, sheep, poultry and dairy industries. Most students continue onto the Certificate IV in Agriculture course before seeking employment in these industries. The Cert II is a one year course and the Cert IV takes an additional year. The NSW Department of Primary Industries runs Tocal. It is a great practical course for student who wish to have careers in the agriculture industry but don't want to go to university. All full-time students live on campus. Tocal offers many scholarships each

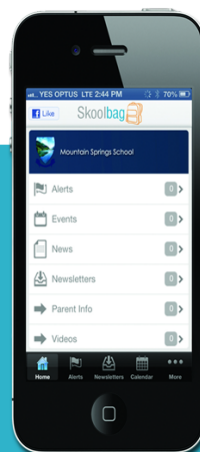
year.

All current HWMHS teaching staff, HWMHS parents who are eligible and Community members can be nominated for the positions. Elected members may hold the office for no more than four (4) years consecutively.

TOP 10 TIPS FOR YEAR 10

STUDENTS CHOOSING

THEIR HSC COURSES

- 01** Choose what you're good at, interested in and which will lay a foundation for your future plans.
- 02** Choose HSC courses best suited to your ability. Don't choose courses just because of scaling or because you think they will give you a better ATAR.
- 03** Make the link between your choice now and where you want to go after Year 12.
- 04** Check if the uni you want to go to (and/or the course you want to do) has prerequisites and assumed knowledge – this booklet has all this info.
- 05** If you want to get an ATAR, make sure you will be eligible.
- 06** Depending on what you study, marks around 70 in the HSC could lead to an ATAR in the 50s, while marks closer to 80 could lead to an ATAR of 80. This is because most students have marks between 70 and 80 so when you are ranked that group really spreads out.
- 07** If you are getting marks in the 70s do whatever you can to get closer to 80 – it will make a big difference to your ATAR.
- 08** Remember that unis award bonus points for your performance in particular HSC courses, and usually for Bands 4 and above.
- 09** If you're not sure what level maths and English to take, choose the level that suits your ability and future plans. You will not necessarily get a higher ATAR just by studying a lower level course, and unis don't always give bonus points for the lower level courses, no matter how well you do. Also check prerequisites in case you need to get a certain performance band.
- 10** To maximise your ATAR you have to make good choices about what to study, work to the best of your ability and work towards your goals for life after school.

Homework/Enrichment Activity Club 2018

Celebrate Attendance

Parents or carers are required, by law, to provide a written or verbal explanation to the Principal within seven days of any absence as to why their child was not at school.

It is important the school receives a written or verbal explanation because:

- (1) It is a parent's legal obligation to explain their child's absence within seven days
- (2) It is a requirement that the school investigate all unexplained absences
- (3) It avoids the school and the School Attendance Officer from making unnecessary investigations
- (4) It is the way the school knows your child was legitimately absent and not truanting from school

If you have any difficulties in providing a written explanation for your child's absence, please contact your school principal.
