National Merino Challenge

On arrival at a wet and rainy Adelaide city, after spending a stressful half an hour to find a park, we had the opportunity to attend the Bulldogs vs Crows AFL Match and some people were lucky enough to find out that \$2 raincoats aren't as waterproof as they say they are.

Saturday morning was the first morning of the Merino Challenge. We were all up bright and early, ready to spend a day networking with possible future employees and learning everything we could about Merinos.

The five of us were split into different groups with both high school students and tertiary students. We were competing in 6 different aspects of the Merino Industry.

They were:

- feed budgeting
- AWEX-ID of fleeces
- greasy fleece price calculations
- condition scoring
- ram selection
- visual assessment
- ewe production

Saturday night we scrubbed up in dinner suits and dresses to attend a formal dinner. This dinner was an opportunity to talk to and get to know people who have experience in the wool industry and gather information to help us with future competitions or to network with potential employers to gather knowledge about the merino industry. We were also very privileged to listen to Michelle Humphries, a very experienced reproductive vet from Jerilderie, give an amazing speech that was very motivational.

After our final session on Sunday afternoon, the AWI committee members concluded the competition with a practice auction. Each team was given a budget and instructions on what type of merino to purchase. This was an amazing opportunity to gain the experience of what a real auction would be like and to teach us budgeting skills.

Overall, the National Merino Challenge wasn't just a fun trip to Adelaide but was also an amazing experience and learning curve for each and every one of us. Thank you to Mr. Caughey and Mrs. Millyard for travelling and looking after us over the 4 days.

Careers News Week 4, Term 2

Subject Selection and the ATAR Video Conference

On Monday all Year 10 students attended a video conference from the University Admissions Centre (UAC) about choosing subjects and the ATAR. UAC have Steps to Uni for Year 10 Students (<https://www.uac.edu.au/assets/documents/Yr10bk2021.pdf>) for helping students decide upon the subjects they should study. Current Year 10 students should also be talking to their teachers about the courses available in their specialist areas.

Year 10 students should do the following when choosing subjects:

1 Identify your end goal? What do you want to do at the end of Year 10, 11 or 12? Can I leave at the end of Year 10 and pursue the career I want?

2. Consider your abilities and interests – choose courses you will enjoy, not because your friends are doing it or as there is nothing you want to do. Students do best at the the subject areas they enjoy.

3. Explore career opportunities. Career expos and university open days are an invaluable source of information on career choices, as is speaking to family, friends, teachers and careers advisers. Consider doing work experience in your area of interest so you can better assess whether a certain career path is a good match for you. If you're not sure about the career path you want to follow, choose subjects that will keep several options open for you.

4. Research study options – courses you choose should reflect your interests and possible career areas. Some university courses have prerequisite subjects, which means if you have not studied the subject for your HSC you cannot study this course. There are a few courses in NSW with prerequisites but in Victoria there are many more courses with strict prerequisites as well as minimum scores in subjects to get into that course.

Western Riverina Tertiary, TAFE and Trades Careers Expo

This one stop, once a year careers expo is being held on Tuesday, 19th June at Leeton High School. It is for students in Years 10 to 12. It is a great day for students who know where they want to focus their career as well as those who are not sure of their career path once they leave school. The cost is only \$7 as School to Work funding has provided travel subsidy.

There are a wide range of exhibitors including tertiary institutions such as universities and TAFEs, large and small employers and industry specific groups. This is the opportunity for your child to access a wide range of career opportunities and find out more about careers that they are interested in and the training and qualifications required. All Year 10, 11 and 12 students were given a permission note on morning assemblies this week and Ms McNally along with the front office have permission notes. Permission notes and payment are due

into the front office by Wednesday, 13th June, 2018, as we have to tell organisers how many students we are taking.

What is your favourite subject at HWMHS and why?

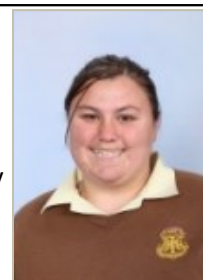
My favourite subject is hospitality. I love to cook and the hospitality class helps improve my cooking skills.
