### Holbrook Sheep & Wool Fair

Last Wednesday 15 students, Ms Bradley & Mr Caughey travelled to Holbrook for the Holbrook Sheep & Wool Fair. The fair is attended by several schools from the Riverina with approximately 180 students competing.

Students firstly attended workshops on Merino sheep judging, sheep health, wool workshop and judging, short and long wool meat sheep judging, sheep judging etiquette, judging Poll Dorset sheep, handling and holding sheep and working dogs.

The first competition was the schools' interbreed sheep competition. The school won five ribbons from first to third.

Thursday saw the open sheep judging competition between stud breeders. With the Dorpers we received five firsts, four seconds, Champion and Reserve Champion Rams and Champion Ewe plus the Most Successful Dorper Exhibitor. Our White Dorper ewes received two firsts, two thirds and Champion Ewe.

The students also competed in individual judging competitions with brilliant results.

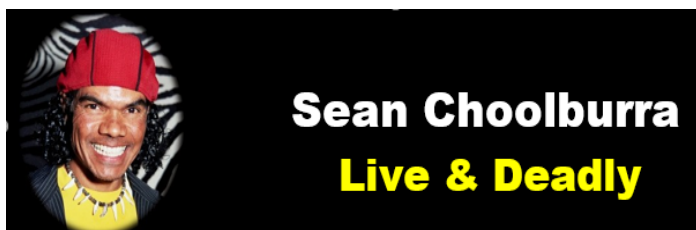

### Casual Work at HWMHS

Throughout the year there are times the school requires casual School Administrative and Support Staff (SASS) e.g. a School Administrative Officer, a School Learning Support Officer, a General Assistant, a Farm Assistant, etc.

At times, our current SASS undertake leave and it is handy to have casual staff on call for day-to-day work or sometimes block work.

If you are interested in being listed as casual SASS please make contact with our front office staff by bringing along your Curriculum Vitae (CV), the names of at least two people as referees, 100 points of identification and your NSW Working With Children's Check document/number for paid employment, which is purchased from the NSW RMS.

Once we have processed your details, and the NSW Department of Education has approved your details we can keep you in mind for any casual work.

### Leather Shoes

All students who are studying Science, Design and Technology, Wood Technology, Metal Technology, Agriculture and Food Technology are required to wear closed in **leather shoes, with a leather tongue**. This means all Year 7 to 10 students, and most Year 11 and 12 students, need leather shoes for the Work, Health and Safety requirements to undertake the compulsory practical components of these courses. There are some shoes that look like leather but are in fact vinyl; they will not protect the student's foot in the case of an accident. When purchasing new school shoes please inspect the shoes carefully, read the box and ask the retailer to find out what the shoes are made from.

### Science Extension Homework

Year 9 and 10 Science students are now offered extension Homework in Science.

Homework is handed out each week between Weeks 2 and 9 of each term, excluding weeks when an assessment task is due.

The homework can be obtained from Mr Mackintosh

(Year 9) or Ms Porter (Year 10) and returned for feedback.

The Homework is also uploaded to Google Classroom so students can access it electronically.

The extension homework will be rolled out to Year 7 students starting Week 2 in Term 3.

### Connecting Country Schools

Our school has been included in the Connecting Country Schools (CCS) project, which is delivering upgraded wireless connectivity and internet access to more than 900 schools around the state.

Planning for installations at our school has commenced with our assigned Technical Officer from the Department's IT Directorate, who is managing this project.

CCS will deliver upgraded and reliable wireless access in all our learning spaces, assisting teachers to deliver future focused learning to prepare our students for digital age jobs.

Improved wireless and internet services will also give students more chances to connect and collaborate and greater access to online knowledge databases, streaming media, educational institutions and experts.

We are working with our Technical Officer to ensure that disruptions during the installation are kept to a minimum.

### 3D Printer

Year 7 and 8 students have kept the 3D printer running hot, making mini boom boxes for their phones (Lily Masters) and some creative USB sticks (Darci Masters).

### Bill Turner Cup Soccer

On Thursday 14 June, the Hay boys U15 soccer team travelled to Griffith to take on Griffith High in the second round of the Bill Turner Cup after their win earlier in the year at the Western Riverina Gala Day. Most of the boys were backing up from a tiring day playing AFL the previous day in Deniliquin.

The fresh Griffith team jumped out of the blocks early with a couple of goals with Hay unable to play the structure that suited them well against Deniliquin and Finley. Adrian Pascoe and Brad Callaghan worked tirelessly in the opening 15 minutes with our midfield unable to provide them with quality ball when the opportunities presented themselves. After a few structural changes at half time, Hay matched Griffith in the opening stages of the second half proving Hay certainly deserved their place in the second round of the competition. As the game went on, Hay ran out of gas after two big days, and Griffith ran out convincing winners 12-0.

Adrian and Brad played well the whole day. A special mention goes to the whole team for playing the game in the right spirit and displaying outstanding sportsmanship; representing both the school and the Hay community proud.





### U15 Basketball

On Monday 18 June, Hay War Memorial High School played host to Tooleybuc and Balranald for a U15 boys and girls basketball gala day. The day was a fantastic opportunity for the students to mix with each other and have an enjoyable day playing some good quality basketball.

The Hay girls took on a very strong Balranald side first, going down 36-2. Considering none of our girls have played any basketball and the Balranald girls regularly travel to Swan Hill to play competitively, the girls fought hard to the end. The Hay girls set the standard for the day playing in the right spirit by providing a player to Balranald when one of their girls wasn't able to play after falling sick on the bus. Olivia Joyce played for Balranald in the first half and Georgia Booth played for them in the second half.

The girls took on Tooleybuc in their second game and whilst they found their shooting range, so too did Tooleybuc, running out 54-19 winners. Once again, the girls put in a credible effort learning as they day went on and showed enormous improvement from their first game to their last. Balranald progressed to the next round after they defeated Tooleybuc. In that game, our own Olivia Joyce played a starring role for Balranald scoring 10 points.



The Hay boys started their day very confidently and displayed their dominance early, going to half time leading 30-0 against Balranald. The scoring dried up in the second half with Balranald knocking down a long range three pointer to the delight of the spectators as Hay ran out 40-3 winners. Hugh Crighton was dominant throughout the first half and early in the second half before earning a well-earned rest. Hugh collected 22 points for the game with Adrian Pascoe also finding some space for some mid-range jump shots and everyone working well defensively.

The boys then took on Tooleybuc in a much anticipated match after Tooleybuc also easily accounted for Balranald in their first game. Hay once again started strong shooting well from the field with Fergus Cattnach

and Hugh collecting rebounds to finish off easy layups. The highlight of the first half was the defensive effort with the team working well together to apply plenty of pressure on each Tooleybuc possession.

Adrian again found his range in the second half as Jaxon Matthews finished off some tough layups to keep the scoreboard ticking over. Hay ran out convincing winners, 40-19, with all players contributing. The Hay boys will now take on Deniliquin in their next match in Week 10 with the winner of that match in a good position to progress to the state finals series later in the year, with the Riverina region qualifying two teams for that series.





### Under 15s AFL

On Wednesday 13 June the U15s girls and boys from Hay travelled to Deniliquin to play in the Giants cup. The boys headed to the Deni Rams oval and the girls to Deni Rovers fields.

The girls had four big games ahead of them with Barham, Moama, Finley and Deni girls all providing teams.

Hay started the day against Barham on the smaller field. The ground was quite dewy and the ball got heavy. After a close first half the girls went back out with a 41 - 14 win over Barham.

Our next game was against Moama and the girls knew they had a tough game. After another close first half, unfortunately Hay fell short of a win with Moama 14 to Hay 6. Then we shifted over to the Rovers oval to play full field. Now with a few injuries we did not have a bench.

Soon after the first bounce it was obvious the Finley girls had played some football together, and regularly, as they moved the ball down the field smoothly utilising space and handballing. Finley were a stronger side and ended up winning the game comfortably.

Finally, after lots of footy, sore legs and muddy jerseys, the girls went into their last game against Deniliquin High. The girls started strongly, knowing they only had 24 minutes left of football. With determination and team work the girls came away with a win in their last game.

All girls played well and displayed a high level of team spirit and sportsmanship across all four games. Some stand out players were Delilah Crighton, Charlee Masters, Amy Fulton (Tooleybuc), Olivia Joyce and Shardia Hutchison.



The boys played two tough matches against Deniliquin and Finley. With Barham a late withdrawal on the day, the draw was changed to ensure the boys got plenty of game time with four 15 minute quarters against both teams. With just the one substitute, the Hay boys combined with Tooleybuc and set about playing a game style that played to our advantage enabling Hugh Crighton to assert his dominance in the ruck and Fergus Cattanach to intercept marks in our defence. While this limited our attacking output, the boys were able to keep Deniliquin to just 9 goals for the game. This included a 4 goal opening quarter, so to keep Deniliquin to just 4

goals for the remainder of the game was an amazing achievement considering the physical dominance that Deniliquin displayed throughout the day.

The boys then immediately backed up again against a fresh Finley side with Finley getting out of the blocks kicking 5 goals in the first quarter. As Hay returned to their game style in the second quarter, the goals dried up until the final term when our boys lost our only substitute with Fergus injuring his nose and a few other boys running on tired legs. Finley finished off kicking 10 goals for the match.

To highlight the defensive effort Hay displayed against Deniliquin, Deniliquin went on to defeat Finley by a massive 17 goals.

Hugh and Fergus were consistent throughout the day with notable performances by Paul Vula and Adrian Pascoe in the midfield and Kenneth Hargreaves swinging between the forward and the backline. It was fantastic to provide solid competition to Deniliquin and Finley after only having 14 players in the U15 team last year with all the boys playing in the right spirits and holding their heads high displaying great comradery.
